During a local interfaith organization meeting, a friend of mine mentioned he was having trouble figuring out how to systemize the then-informal library of the Islamic Association where he was serving as a board member & volunteership coordinator—of course I absolutely had to offer my help. I created a project proposal timeline and budgetary outline for the IAR to help structure this endeavor, making a compendium including (but not limited to): necessary supplies, ILS options (alongside projected potential rates for non-profits), introductory guides to managing small-institution volunteer libraries, OCLC web courses, and proposed directions of collection expansion. Something I wanted to be particularly mindful of in in designing a 'Masjid Library 101 Launchpad' for my friend was flexibility and accessibility—it needed to be amenable to the unique needs of the community, as the IAR serves not only as a religious and social center for the Raleigh Muslim community, but also is home to Al-Iman, a non-profit K-8 day school; additional factors of consideration included the library's limited budget (operating primarily charitable donations) as well as the volunteer-exclusive staff.

SYNAGOGUE LIBRARY REORGANIZATION | JUNE 2018 | BETH ISRAEL SYNAGOGUE

I joined the library committee of my then-local synagogue on a short-term basis as a way to assist during renovations. This process included reorganizing, weeding, and classifying the community's extensive collection.

VISIONS OF INFINITY: KUBA CLOTH | FALL 2019 | NC STATE & GREGG MUSEUM OF ART AND DESIGN Completed during the first semester of my internship with the Gregg Museum in conjunction with the History department at NC State, with the goal of deepening the institution's information on their collection of Kuba. Kuba cloth, also known as 'Kasai Velvet', is a multifaceted textile of the Bakuba People, primarily from the region that is now known as the Democratic Republic of the Congo. My research of Kuba for the Gregg was a two-fold pursuit: historiography (encompassing the wider history of Kuba cloth and its multiplicities of ceremonial and commercial contexts, with special attention to the impact of centuries of colonization on the region and its peoples) as well as an aesthetic investigation, with the goal of drawing novel conclusions on the intentions and applications of my institution's particular pieces of Kuba. As part of this project, I was awarded a departmental research grant to travel to Washington DC and visit the research libraries and collections of both the Smithsonian Museum of African Art and Georgetown Textile Museum.

WHITE SUPREMACIST IDENTITARIANISM & NEW TECHNOLOGIES* | FALL 2020 | NC STATE UNIVERSITY Combining my research concentrations of new technologies and the sociopolitical functions of religion in the 21st century, I proposed an independent research project investigating the activities of white supremacist religious groups in social media and related online communities. My goal with this project is to articulate and attenuate the doctrinal origins and self-construction of this movement from an interdisciplinary basis, drawing additionally from the fields of Philosophy, Sociology, and Media Studies. This project will be completed in Fall 2020.
